Hope Center for Autism: Opening Doors to Limitless Futures in Martin County

Located in the heart of Martin County, the Hope Center for Autism serves as a vital resource for children and young adults with autism spectrum disorder (ASD). Under the dedicated leadership of Executive Director Joanne Sweazey (Class 34), the Center is proud to be the



the county's only public charter school tailored specifically for students with autism. Catering to children from Pre-K through 8th grade, the Center also offers its innovative "Next Step" program, focusing on social development, communication, and vocational readiness, helping every student grow with purpose and confidence.

Founded in 2002, the Hope Center for Autism provides evidence-based instruction that aligns with Florida's educational standards, prioritizing independence and behavioral growth. With intentionally small class sizes, typically one staff member for every three students, the Center ensures individualized attention that fosters success both in and outside the classroom. The "Next Step" program further equips teens and young adults with essential skills through social skills groups, life coaching, and real-world job training, bridging the gap between school and adulthood.

The need for specialized education like this is pressing. Nationally, 1 in 31 children is diagnosed with ASD, and in Martin County's growing population of over 158,000 residents, many families are seeking this transformative support. Additionally, 85% of adults with autism remain unemployed, highlighting the critical importance of early and ongoing intervention.

The Hope Center is embarking on its most ambitious initiative yet: acquiring or constructing a state-of-the-art facility in Martin County. This expansion will enable the Center to support more children and families while addressing its waiting list of 385 students, positively impacting countless lives. The recent hiring of Chris Vaccaro (Class 34) as Director of Business Development will help strengthen community partnerships, increase awareness, and secure resources necessary to realize this vision in Martin County.

The Hope Center for Autism is more than just a school; it is a lifeline. It is a place where potential meets opportunity, challenges become triumphs, and hope firmly takes root in our community.
