Class 25 Participates in Challenging Ropes Course

Martin Youth LEADERship's Class 25 participated in C.O.P.E Day, a Challenging, Outdoor Personal Experience ropes course at Tanah Keeta Scout Reservation.

C.O.P.E. is a youth development and leadership activity presented by volunteers of Gulf Stream Council Learning for Life. Facilitators included COPE Day chairman Alec Connolly, recently retired from the Gulf Stream Council Boy Scouts of America; Stephen Peterson and Will Roads.

C.O.P.E. presented the students with a series of outdoor challenges, beginning with basic group initiative games and progressing to more complicated low-course and high-course activities. The course is designed to help participants reinforce self-confidence and build trust and leadership skills.

Some C.O.P.E. events involved group effort, whereas others focused on individual skills and agility. Participants climbed, swung, balanced, jumped, and rappelled all while devising solutions to a variety of problems. The program emphasized the "five finger" goals of safety, trust, respect, accountability and self-esteem, as well as teamwork, leadership, decision-making and problem-solving. While participation was completely voluntary, most students found that they could accomplish much more than they initially thought possible.

The highlight for most of the members of the class was the 30-foot high Confidence Pole. Wearing climbing harnesses attached to safety lines held by their peers on the ground, participants scaled the pole to reach a small platform at the top. Once at the top of the pole, students were challenged to take a "leap of faith" by jumping from the pole. C.O.P.E. Day gave the participants the opportunity to experience successes that come from taking calculated risks while applying basic leadership skills.

The purpose of LEADERship Martin County Alumni is to support the Martin County Youth LEADERship Program; to provide education and networking opportunities for our Alumni; and to enhance community awareness of our members by providing opportunities to evaluate and act on issues affecting the community.

LEADERship is committed to developing future leaders through the Youth LEADERship and scholarship programs.
